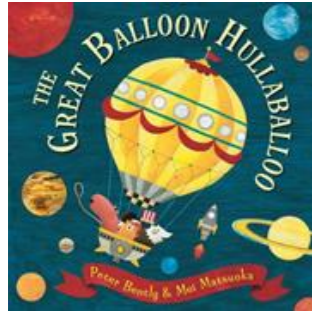
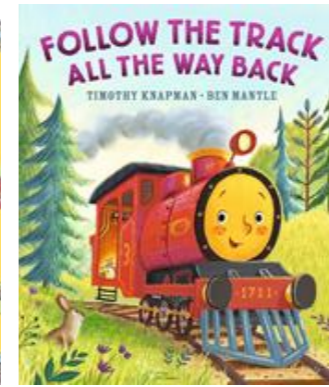
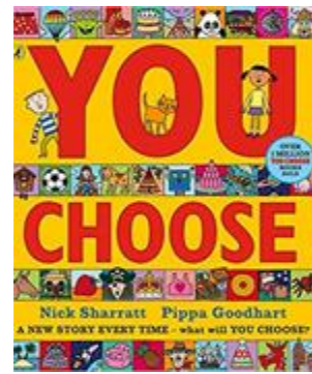
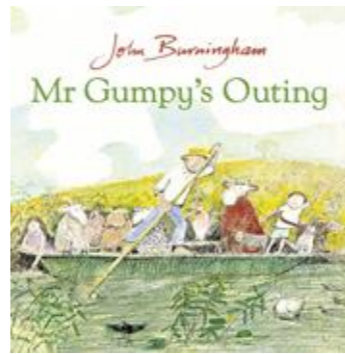
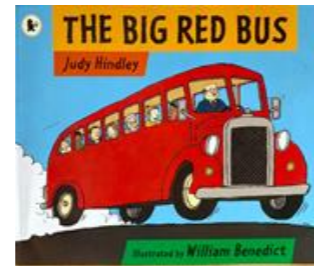


Books we have read:

Engine – A machine that makes vehicles move.

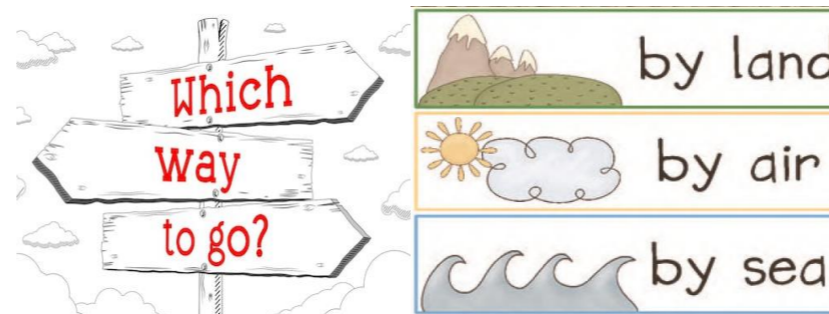
Music: Transport

Modes of transport we have discussed

Submarine -

A vessel that can go deep under water.



Jet Ski -

A small jet-propelled vehicle that skims across the top of the water.



Train -

A railway engine connected to carriages for carrying people.



Ship -

A vessel larger than a boat for transporting people or goods.



Rocket -

A flying device shaped like a tube which has lots of power to fly very high.



Canoe -

A long light, narrow boat with pointed ends which people move with the paddle.



Sail boat -

A small vessel for travelling over water, propelled by sails or an engine.



Camper Van -

A van that has furniture fitted meaning people can live and sleep in it.



Motor Bike -

A 2 or 3 wheeled vehicle powered by the engine and steered by the handle bars.



Hot air balloon -

A large balloon filled with heated air that floats in the sky carrying people in the basket underneath.



Pedalo -

A small pedal operated boat used for enjoying water.



Horse-drawn carriage -

A vehicle with wheels that is pulled by horses.



Tractor -

A farm vehicle that is used to pull farm machinery.



Quad Bike -

A small vehicle which has 4 wheels that can be driven on bumpy surfaces.



Helicopter -

A vehicle that flies using a rotor blade at the top meaning it can move in any direction.



Rowing boat -

A small boat that is propelled through water by pulling the oars.



Bicycle -

A two-wheeled vehicle that moves by turning the two pedals.



Chinook Helicopter -

Heavy lifting helicopter with two rotor blades at the top mostly used by the army.



Bus -

A large vehicle designed to carry passenger usually for a fixed route.



Van -

A small or medium sided road vehicle with a space for carry goods.



Aeroplane -

A flying vehicle with wings powered by the engine.



Lorry -

A large road vehicle used to transport lots of goods.



Tram -

A public transport vehicle, usually powered by electricity from wires above.



Car -

A vehicle typically with four wheels with room for a small number of passengers.
